



HAVE YOUR OWN ''QUIZ OF TWO CITIES''

RULES OF THE GAME

For swell fun at home, stage a "Quiz of Two Cities" just as Gunther's does it on the air between Baltimore and Washington. The same competitive spirit will make it just as popular with your guests.

First, choose 2 teams, dividing your crowd evenly, women against the men, married against single or any way that is most competitive. Give each one pencil and paper and the master of ceremonies is ready to begin the quizzing.

The members of each team then are numbered 1-2-3-4, etc. (each team has 4 on the "Quiz of Two Cities"). The same set of questions is asked each contestant with corresponding numbers so that they are competing directly against each other.

Each contestant writes the answers to his set of 3 questions. Numbers 1 and 2 of the general information type are worth 10 points each and the bonus question is worth 20 points. A perfect score earns 40 points for the team. The master of ceremonies keeps an accurate score on each one and, when all contestants have been quizzed, the team points are totaled and the highest score wins.

QUIZ QUESTIONS

- Name at least one of the two principals in the most famous duel that ever occurred in the United States.
 - Ans. Aaron Burr and Alexander Hamilton.
- 2. In soccer they use a ball, and in tennis they use a ball—what do they use in ice hockey and badminton?

Ans. Hockey—a puck; Badminton—a shuttlecock.

Bonus: In a checker game, white gains a one man lead. He then sacrifices two men and wins three. How do they stand now?

Ans. White has a two man lead.

 Four heavyweight boxing champions of the world had the same first name and middle initial. Give that first name and middle initial.

Ans. James I.

2. What great invention is generally associated with the teakettle?

Ans. The steam engine, invented by James Watt.

Bonus: A man starts to work at 10:30 A. M. and works until 2:30. He takes 60 minutes for lunch and starts to work again at 3:30. He stops work at 6 o'clock. How long did he work?

Ans. 61/2 hours.

- 1. A famous fort called Morro Castle guards the harbor of what city?

 Ans. Havana, Cuba.
- 2. A misogynist is a man who dislikes what?

Ans. Women.

Bonus: The following name and address with all the words spelled out contains how many I's?

Mister Milton Keith Dennison Springfield, Illinois

Ans. 9 I's.

- The city of Canberra is the capital of what great nation?
 Ans. Australia.
- One of the most famous weapons ever used by the United States Army is named after a city. What is this weapon?
 Ans. Springfield rifle.
- Bonus: Suppose you had 4 pencils spread out on a table in front of you. From left to right the colors were—red, green, yellow and white. You move the white before the yellow, the green before the red and the white before the green. What is the color on the right end?

Ans. Yellow.

- What famous invasion force was routed by Sir Francis Drake?
 Ans. Spanish Armada.
- 2. The Columbia River forms the boundary line between what two states?

 Ans. Washington and Oregon.
- Bonus: There are six boys in a class— Frank, Laurence, Charles, Philip, James and Clarence. They are to be arranged alphabetically and numerically from one to six. Who will be number four? Ans. James.
- What very well-known line of poetry precedes the following line: "Whence all but he had fled"?

- Ans. "The Boy Stood on the Burning Deck."
- 2. Give the names of two popular songs whose titles mention fruit.

Ans. "Yes, We Have No Bananas,"
"In the Shade of the Old Apple

Bonus: How many F's are there in the following paragraph?

Ans. Five F's.

 In which of the following cities would it take the longest time to hard boil an egg—Baltimore, Denver, Washington or Chicago?

Ans. Denver.

Bonus: If you had 24 coins and ½ were nickels and the rest pennies, how much money would you have?

Ans. 56c.

- 2. Who made a fortune out of a mouse?
